## **Editor's Notes**

#### Hello Readers,

in what must be much cooler times than last time '58' was sent out!

Your society has been busy as usual what with 'Zoom' meetings and the ever increasing activities of the 'Cecilia' group who have been working particularly hard both on the boat and with the boat. They are hoping to have somewhat of a respite within the next few weeks, at least with trips out, so that other jobs may be focussed upon.

Something different has happened lately here at Alvechurch apart from changes at the 'Weighbridge' with Jayne and John leaving. The orchard moorings which have been in situ for a great many years are now vacated. At the time of going to press it is unclear why this has happened as many long time moorers have now been displaced. The canal edge does look very untidy at the moment (see pictures) and '58' will be monitoring things as the last thing needed there are buildings. The orchard itself provides much food and shelter to local wild life and ought to be preserved as such. Mind you we thought that about the canal side at Stoke Prior as well and look what's happened there! If anyone could share any information with us about this we'd be very grateful. A few editions ago, we ran an article about the reservoir keeper's cottage at Lower Bittell. Readers may recall that it had been left empty for a long time and was in danger of deteriorating



even further. The property has now been connected to the main sewerage system as the Environment Agency would not allow a septic tank to be dug so close to fresh water which surrounds the cottage. We understand that the property will not be sold owing to the area being required by C&RT for operational purposes. However, the resources required to make it habitable for renting out have apparently dried up for the time being. Presumably this would have included the under pinning that we had been advised is a requirement to make the structure safe. '58' hopes that this

can be rectified just as soon as possible and this heritage building can once more be utilised and looked after properly.

Readers may be aware that the society has been looking to find a new home for the model boat lift (*pictured below*) that some may have seen on display for a short time in the meeting room.



Ed Butcher has kindly agreed to look after it at his house in Droitwich for the time being pending a more permanent move. If any readers have any ideas about this please do get in touch as even Ed may soon tire of playing boat lifts! Neil has tried several places including Avoncroft and Bromsgrove Museums without success. It seems such a shame that this artefact cannot currently be seen by a wider audience even though there has been somewhat of a 'creative licence' situation in relation to its likeness to the actual one used at Tardebigge during the very early part of the 19th century.

The society is hoping that the next

meeting scheduled for December 7th can go ahead using a combination of 'Zoom', or equivalent, as well as the usual meeting room. Please do watch out for confirmation of this on social media and website etc. as we have just heard that the planned speaker from C&RT has given back word despite being asked some time ago. #### **Lapal Canal Restoration News**



Our friends from the Lapal Canal Trust have been busy as usual with a work party held recently along the canal route which runs alongside Weoley Castle ruins. There was a very good turnout of local people, councillors and the Member of Parliament such is the interest in this project. The main focus for the work party was litter picking and there certainly was plenty of it all piled up ready for collection by Birmingham City Council Refuse Department. Hopefully as things progress the canal line will not be used as a general dumping ground unfortunately appearing to be coming from some neighbouring properties.

The new winding hole on the Worcester and Birmingham Canal in Selly Oak has still not happened but is expected soon. This will eventually enable boats to enter the new section of canal which, when fully restored, will join the original canal line in Selly Oak Park.

The Trust's prime focus has been about this first part of the restoration in Selly Oak which has been delayed by the need to sort out the complex land ownership issues. The land ownership agreement has finally been agreed and it's been circulated for signing off by the 4 main parties involved.

Paul Whitwick has featured the Dudley No 2 canal in his 10-minute YouTube <a href="https://youtu.be/S5PZVAFoGwo">https://youtu.be/S5PZVAFoGwo</a>. This has been seen by literally 30,000 plus viewers with over £500 donated to the cause. The 31st AGM took place, as advertised in the last edition of '58', with Justin Malpass and Paul Smith being appointed as additional Directors and Trustees. The Trust's monthly boat trips for 'SENSE' resumed with passengers from the Tanglewood SENSE care home in Malvern, photos of which are on the Trust's facebook page.

Very recently a Zoom meeting was held with LCT representatives and Canal and River Trust along with a planning officer. The meeting, which was chaired by Ailith Rutt from C&RT, went into much detail required by C&RT in order for the restoration to be connected to the Worcester and Birmingham Canal. Topics covered included water supply, the new swing bridge, lowering of the gas main and fibre way which is currently under the towpath of the W&B, the needs of residential moorings on the new section and any potential dredging for the new junction. There is clearly much still to do here which has to be commenced by 2025 if the section 106 money is to remain in place. However, walkers can now access the new section via the under croft alongside the Bristol Road which leads onto the Sainsbury's site and the Harborne Lane bridge.

thoughts on this welcome. - Ed.






#### **November Meeting**

Report of the November Meeting via Zoom.

The society's November Meeting, taking place via the increasingly popular medium of



Zoom, was somewhat of a move away from our usual waterway related themes. The illustrated talk, delivered by military historian Tim Barney of Evesham, was about the role played by the people involved with RAF Defford during World War 2 and beyond, particularly the development of airborne radar from which most of today's aircraft rely on.

Many people will have heard of the secret role played at Bletchley Park in Buckinghamshire, but from 1942 to the 1960s, this quiet Worcestershire

backwater was one of the most secret places in Britain. Staff there carried out scientific work that was just as vital to the Allied war effort as Bletchley was. Taking in an eighteenth century mansion and a landscape park, a wartime airfield and the early story



of airborne radar development, this fascinating talk had something for everyone.

Some members present actually had personal experience of some of the many air related items shared with the participants and were able

to share this much to the delight of the presenter Tim.

The story concluded to the present day with a brief account of the National Trust property at Croome Park (above) and the RAF Defford Museum (right), both of which are open to the public. There are web sites available for any readers wishing to discover more about these places which could well be on the 'bucket list' for several people.





## 'Nature Notes' Mary Green

The swans that nested in spring on a pool not far from me have reappeared down the canal. They have two healthy grown-up cygnets with them, still quite brown. They will stay together till the parents start next year's breeding and nesting process, when the young will be sent packing if they haven't gone! There are also some young adult swans around which have just lost the last tinges of brown – last year's cygnets – and a two more adults that look to be paired up. I wonder where they will nest. The established pair won't want them nearby

It's been a wonderful year for fruiting trees and shrubs along the canal, especially those that flowered in May or later, when we had a warm dry spell. They include holly, hawthorn, guelder-rose, spindle, wild service tree, elder and crab apple. Some earlier flowering trees like wild cherry did less well, though blackthorn and buckthorn are fine. There's a feast there for birds. And the late-flowering ivy, with berries ripening now, will provide follow-up.

Nut bearing trees are not so good, except horse chestnut which flowered well in May and had lovely conkers. Hazel was hit especially hard because the male and female flowers got out of synch in the strange stop-start winterspring. There were very few nuts, but next year's catkins are there now. Beech did well though there are some lovely ones in Shortwood.

Oaks here have had no acorns. I don't know how far this spreads (they have them in Yorkshire!) but it often happens. They all collaborate in some years on not producing acorns while they recoup their strength, then another year – a "mast" year - they will produce a huge crop, another year a normal one – but always together. They communicate this through their roots and mycorrhizal fungi, so







they don't compete with their neighbours. Last year was a mast year, this year a rest.

Sweet chestnuts set fruit well, but it wasn't a warm and sunny enough summer for the nuts to really swell fully. Their food value would be poor. All of this means that some birds and mammals which feed on nuts will have slim pickings this winter – squirrels and jays especially. Others like blackbirds, redwings and fieldfares that eat berries will have a good winter.

I've heard back from the local C&RT about my concerns that their new mowing regime is harming biodiversity. They still claim flowers growing to their proper height by the canal hamper visibility. But they are considering a less harsh cutting regime, so we'll see. To me, anyone managing vegetation should understand what plants are there, how they grow and flower, and how to make sure all the species can thrive together. Any cutting back for human benefit needs to be based on this. Unfortunately, it is more often cut-it-all-down on a calendar date.

The mixture of flowers and grass we get on undisturbed ground is an important and increasingly rare habitat, hosting diverse wildlife and capturing carbon. Underneath are roots and fungi. Fungi survive for years, only some popping up as fungal bodies or mushrooms. I found some lovely hedgehog mushrooms again at Shortwood this autumn – uncommon now and edible.

The trees turned colour late this year so the canalside stayed green. Now it's looking wintrier. Remember insects, fungi and even small mammals, amphibians and invertebrates are living all around you and under your feet with the roots of the plants – it's not dead.



#### History Corner - 20 Years Ago

In December 2001, the '58' team of Jon Axe, Ron and Betty Millward used colour photography on the front and back covers which looked really eye catching. However, in that edition were a number of articles about 'Tylers Lock' which was the then name given to the former 'Engine House' just above lock 57 of the Tardebigge Flight. The 'Engine House' used to house the large pump that brought water up from the reservoir to just above lock 58. It had become a night club and eventually a pub run by Andy and Caren Taite and received much business from the canal users, particularly during the main boating season. The society held several events there, as did other groups, which were always well patronised. The property is now a privately owned residence which has been somewhat of a loss to many a boater, or walker and cyclist, doing 29 locks upstream and in need of refreshments.

#### 'Cecilia' & volunteers report November 2021

This month has been both very busy and successful. The trip season for 'Cecilia' has closed and now the hard work starts with the second phase of the refurbishment of the dear old lady. Bill's work parties are continuing and we are actively engaged with C&RT on our adoptions around Tardebigge.

#### **National Community Boats Association (NCBA)**

Our RYA trainer Bob Strachan has now retired so we needed to find a new partner for training and approving helms persons. We have investigated alternatives and recommend that our society join the NCBA. This has a variety of advantages but mainly that their training regime is recognised by C&RT and the Maritime Coastguard Agency. They will train us to be trainers so that we can then train others. More information about this next time.

#### **New Crew**

We have had a week of training new crew who are keen to become helms persons themselves. During the first week in November we took 9 members out on training days. They helmed 'Cecilia' through a number of tricky situations including tunnels (very dark), Anglo Welsh (very tight) and winding the boat at Tardebigge.

The intrepid nine were Maxine Quinn, Nick Hadley, Lisa Winterbourne, Gerrard Nash, Mike Crook, Barry Kinsella, Steve Partridge, John Talbut and Al Gibbs. The trainers on the Monday were Ed Butcher and Neil Franklin; Tuesday - Ken Robinson and Trevor Albutt; Wednesday - Ian McGarr and Ed Butcher.

The days didn't include going through any locks so they had it easy. Next time it's the Tardebigge Flight! Just when they thought this boating thing was a piece of cake!

'Cecilia' is booked in to have her hull blacked on 16th January 2023. We like to plan ahead.

Ken, Steve and Trev have met to sort out the works required on the boat. Our main task is to stop the windows leaking by refitting them – again! This also includes refurbishing the inside frames and the water damaged walls. We are also looking at painting the superstructure and replacing the seating.

If you want to help in this herculean task please contact Neil or Ken. Everyone is welcome to lend a hand. We need all the help we can get!

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In addition, we also propose to update the 'Cecilia' description on the society's web page. Keep your eyes open for Ed Butcher's journalism and Wendy's editing.

#### **Bookings**

During the past month we have taken out parties as diverse as Primrose Hospice, Walking Buddies, and SEN families. This was funded with monies raised by Julie from the National Lottery Heritage Fund. External charitable trips have raised over £1,000 during this short season. Wendy is already taking bookings for next season. This is the best part of volunteering on 'Cecilia' as our guests always enjoy themselves and so do we. It is particularly heart warming when a young man, under our supervision, takes to the helm like a natural and his family are thrilled that he has shown a confidence they rarely see.

Home EdVenturers have donated over £2,400 since July. Julie (Home Ed coordinator) is already



talking to people like the 'Lounge' in Alvechurch about lock challenges in the new year.

On a lock challenge the children get an individual certificate for completing the Tardebigge Flight. 30 locks, 200 feet, over a distance of two and a quarter miles in one day - they certainly deserve their certificate (pictured left).

#### **Finances**

Julie has raised over £1,500 herself in grants this year which will enable us to provide polo shirts for

the crew as well as going towards making 'Cecilia' self - financing. We are currently working on a financial plan for our society treasurer - honest!

#### The Model Boat Lift

After an epic move, the story of which is due out on Netflix next year, the model is now in Ed Butcher's shed for safe keeping. We will continue to look for a new home for it where it can be displayed to the public. It does however need refreshing.

#### Safeguarding

We are proposing to issue a 'Safeguarding Policy' in the new year as the volunteers do spend quite some time with young people and vulnerable adults.

Anyone can come along and help with 'Cecilia' or at our Tardebigge adoptions and hopefully soon, on the 'Wanderer' work boat, so please get in touch and we'll get you on board.
