Editor's Notes

Hello Readers

I trust you've all been enjoying the particularly hot weather we have being experiencing in July? Trouble is we still need water to keep plants growing and we particularly need it to keep our canals going. As this editorial is written, there are already restrictions in place on some parts of the Leeds and Liverpool Canal where water supply problems have occurred on previous occasions.

Canal and River Trust usually send boat owners monthly information known as 'Canal Boaters Update'. A recent bulletin makes particular mention of water safety and retention issues which can be problematic during hot spells, ironically when boat movements are at their highest:

"The hot, dry summers have a significant impact on the charity's water resources, with the very low rainfall so far this year sadly resulting in a number of restrictions and closures. The Trust is asking boaters, with the help of volunteer lock keepers, to be even more careful than usual to conserve water.

Boaters can help by sharing locks where possible and making sure paddles are fully closed after use.

The Trust's swing bridges and other moveable structures are vulnerable in a heatwave, with extreme heat causing expansion of the materials which at worst will cause them to become stuck. The Trust is asking boaters to be careful when using them and to report any problems via the 'Contact Us' page of the website.

Summer is one of the most popular times for people to go boating, and millions more come to visit Britain's canals and rivers. While it may be tempting to get in the water, shallow water and obstructions beneath the surface can cause injury if people jump in. Deeper water around docks and locks will be very cold, even in the summer, which could cause cold water shock. The Trust is urging everyone to stay out of the water and is reminding boaters to be alert to any people who may not be following this advice and who may be in the water and harder to spot when manoeuvring a boat."

The latter paragraph gives a particularly stark reminder of the dangers with some fatalities already reported in the National media around the Salford Quays area on the Manchester Ship Canal.

The issue of water conservation is an ever present which makes it even more concerning when C&RT have a notice on Tardebigge Top Lock, one of the deepest narrow locks in the country, requiring boaters to empty the lock after every upward passage. No reason is given for this but it does waste a large lock of water unless another boat is waiting to descend. This results in flooding lower down the flight with water cascading over lock gates and on some occasions the towpath. Perhaps C&RT could explain this to '58' as we have no doubt it is a complete waste and outwith the statement above regarding conservation.



In past editions of '58' we have wondered how it appears that C&RT do not communicate with such as WB&DCS on various issues of mutual interest on and around our waterways. We are still unsure why so many notice boards on the W&B have been removed and not replaced, meaning

that there are none at all between Tardebigge and Birmingham, as well as those removed lower the canal. We are similarly unaware of the actual circumstances surrounding the loss of the orchard moorings at Alvechurch, although there are several rumours that C&RT are interested in the site. '58' is also unaware as to the reason behind the moorings on the long pound below Tardebigge top lock being altered from 14 days to just 2. Tardebigge is a very popular place for boaters to stay a few days and explore this fascinating area but there is nowhere to tie up to between the tunnel and top lock which makes the ones below even more important as mooring rings are in situ.



We are aware that our very active volunteers are now meeting with C&RT so let's hope that these issues can be discussed and answers forthcoming; we have, after all, the same interests!

During the last edition we alluded to some towpath improvements close to Lane House Aqueduct near Alvechurch with more on this now completed task later. The society has also held its monthly gatherings including a 'talk and walk' around the Selly Oak area which was preceded by the annual Selly Oak Park Festival. Again further details of these further on. We will also feature a report of a past long trip on 'Cecilia' as well as Lapal Canal Restoration news plus our usual volunteering news and Mary's Nature Notes.

The articles sent in for publication this month have as usual all come from volunteers and largely members of the society. '58' is extremely grateful for these contributions and seeing as we are now in the height of Summer, we hope that others will be able to send in any pictures taken on or around our wonderful waterways. Hope to see you on our August 2nd walk, which is in Droitwich this time, and don't forget the society's Annual General meeting on September 6th which is advertised in this edition.

Stay safe especially near locks and enjoy the read.

Heritage Open Days 2022

Our society will be taking part in the National Trust's Heritage Open Days (HoDs) again for 2022.

As I am sure you know we at the WB&DCS like to do something a little different from time to time and some of you may remember our efforts at last year's Heritage Open Days.



For those of you new to this event it took place around the Tardebigge New Wharf area and consisted of our member volunteers along with some volunteers from C&RT showing members of the public around the top lock and wharf area giving a guided view of how the area would have looked when in full industrial swing. This year will focus around the top lock section of the Tardebigge canal flight and see the site of our local 'Astounding Invention' – the perpendicular boat lift.

Volunteer guides will provide a snapshot of canal building endeavours and explain the aims of water management, from the summit of the longest narrow lock flight in Britain, including the engineering feat of the Experimental Perpendicular boat lift which was a mechanical marvel of its day.

The story of the Wharf and the surrounding landscape is placed into context visiting the current wharf and sites of past quays, quarries, rail tracks, lime kilns and the site of the experimental lift itself which today is replaced with one of the deepest narrow locks in the country.

The event days themselves are part of a national fortnight of heritage events coordinated by the National Trust and in our case supported by C&RT.

This year the event will coincide with the Tardebigge show on the Saturday.

We are inviting members to take part as guides or helpers on the day. As previously we support volunteers in visiting the area and walking around the site to familiarize you and provide you with some local information and anecdote that can be used for you to take a small group on a short walk and show them the highlights of the area.

There is no pressure to memorize a script, most people from last year said they remember what they find interesting and can show others these sights referring to a 'crib sheet' if there are other things they wish to impart.

The event dates are the weekend of Sept 10th and 11th 2022.

We aim to be running tours hourly on both days at 10.00, 11.30, 13.00 and 14.30.

Our event submission has been accepted and is on the Heritage Open Day website, just type in 'Tardebigge' in the events search box or use this direct link: https://bit.ly/3z3MqCu

Last year's event was well supported and all had a good and interesting time.

This year we will also need to staff the publicity gazebo up at the Tardebigge show and to have a team on 'Cecilia' to offer information and provide refreshments for walkers and guides.

W are also planning to offer short boat trips on 'Cecilia' through the Tardebigge tunnel and return after winding at the Old Wharf.

'Nature Notes' Mary Green

I don't know why the CRT hadn't done any cutting of the flowering plants along the canal here before now this year, but I was pleased. I've never seen such variety of plants, a true corridor of biodiversity. A friend found and showed me an unusual orchid growing by the towpath – a pyramidal orchid, a kind I haven't seen round here – which must have been waiting there for years to come up. Two days later they mowed, but I had told them, and I think we saved it!

Another plant I discovered in two places was pignut. One patch was on the aquatic fringe, the other by a wood. Pignut grows in old undisturbed turf, so it's unusual by the canal. By the "dead-arm wood" it's understandable: it grows in that wood formed on a remnant of old meadow. The others near the aqueduct are near very old trees, possibly once woodland edge. Pignut looks like a little cow parsley with delicate feathery leaves. Underground it has an edible tuberous "nut". Many animals including badgers dig them up for food – and people used to. It's thought to be the origin of the song "Here we go gathering nuts in May."

Pignut is the food plant for a moth called the chimney sweeper, which as you might expect is sooty black. I've seen some this year.

Unfortunately, the stretch on the aquatic fringe is where CRT have been strengthening the bank and have dug up a lot of the turf, so we'll have to see how well it survives. It's a shame they don't know what they've got. Where they have been strengthening banks elsewhere round here, they infill with soil from elsewhere and re-plant or re-seed. I hope they get this right.

I also found ragged robin growing by the






canalside, a very pretty plant of wet meadows. As it's near houses it may have come from a garden, but it's a lovely native plant and has survived so far.

Mostly it's the common plants that have done so well and by the time you read this if they still haven't cut it drastically, there are meadowsweet, willowherb, marsh woundwort and purple loosestrife in full flower.

It isn't just humans who remove vegetation. Last year there was a beautiful patch of a plant called arrowhead growing and flowering in the water near here. I watched a swan demolish it! Usually most creatures (like the amazing elephant hawk moth caterpillars on the willowherb) don't take enough food to alter the balance.

The waterbirds have done well this year. The Canada goslings are grown up, one goose nearby raising ten! I was worried when I found the swan nest empty but there they were on the reservoir and the seven cygnets had survived. I have seen moorhen chicks and grebe chicks as well as plenty of mallard ducklings. I found the reed buntings again this year near Bittell and I think I heard reed warblers too. There have been plenty of swallows and martins by Bittell, which like to feed near water and need wet mud for their nests. They also need cracks and crannies in old buildings to nest, and there were lots around Bittell Farm.

It's been interesting watching the natural succession of plants when they are left alone. When the cow parsley dies down another similar plant called chervil comes out beautifully by the towpath. Then later comes hedge parsley, less common but delicate and slightly pink. Each one has its own place and time. Natural diversity is a far cry from "planting wildflowers."

Lapal Canal Trust News



The new winding hole at Selly Oak on the W&B, opposite what will be the entrance to restored Dudley No.2 Canal, continues to take shape. The area is currently being referred to as 'Whitehouse Wharf' after the family that ran a business there for many years before the last firm Goodman's. Where the old canal junction used to be, and the surrounding area, had previously been known as Selly Port.

'58' understands that the new winding hole development is due for completion very soon and the excavated section will be re-watered. The on-going task for the Trust is fund raising, particularly for the lowering of the gas main and fibre way under the opposite towpath, so that a new swing bridge can be fitted and a connection to the W&B can follow.

Paul's knowledge of this fascinating topic and attention to detail was exemplary and really appreciated by the audience.

July Walk

During the month of July, the society held the first of its walks which took place at Selly Oak on a warm evening. The group was met by Hugh Humphreys from the Lapal Canal Trust who showed the progress on the new winding hole before leading the walkers along the new canal route and beyond into Selly Oak Park. Hugh explained that the Waterway Recovery Group would be working around the old canal bridge in the park during August, possibly the oldest example on the whole of the BCN, in order to provide a ramp for disabled people or those using prams. The new towpath would then cross over this very well used bridge on to the other side next to the park.

Denis led the walkers further on to show the work needing to be done to the canal bed and towpath in order to get past the park. Those walkers who had not seen this before were absolutely fascinated with the restoration project and what it will undoubtedly bring to Selly Oak. 
The Navigation Medallions, a once only limited edition of 100, were struck a while sgo. Each medallion is individually numbered (1-100) and is engraved with the holder's name.

Towpath Improvements

In the last edition of '58' progress on the towpath improvements near the Lane House Aqueduct in Alvechurch were reported on. Canal & River Trust News

Canal and River Trust has recently sent out a reminder to boat owners regarding the identification requirements needed on each craft. '58' is pleased to endorse this request which is printed verbatim below:

Please help us by displaying your boat's index number, licence and name.

Most boats correctly display their index number licence and boat name, but recently we have started to see an increase in those that don't. It's important to display your boat's details so that in the event of an accident or problem with the boat, we can identify and contact the boater concerned. It also reduces the time spent by our boat licence rangers, who lose time when trying to identify non-displaying boats. If we can't identify your boat, we aren't able to accurately record sightings and this may impact on future licensing decisions, particularly if you don't have a home mooring.

Licence Support Officer checks boat licences in London. The British Waterways Act 1971 requires a boat's name and index to be displayed 'conspicuously' and the boat licence terms and conditions specify the details are displayed on both sides of the boats, easily visible. We are starting a new process to address non-displaying boats on the waterway, which could result in enforcement action, so please make sure you're displaying your boat details correctly and speak to fellow boaters that might not be.

If you need a replacement index number or plastic Licence Holder, you should visit our online shop or contact our customer services team.

Also on the C&RT web site is an address from Chief executive Richard Parry who talks about volunteers, funding and the trust's future plans. Richard explains where the trust is in relation to making sure that the waterways are accessible to all users while recognising the key role played by boaters. The short presentation is also available on YouTube and well worth listening to.


